GOALS AND ACTIVITIES:

1. Facilitate interagency coordination in support of AGIC Council Goals that fosters collaboration between local, tribal, county, state government, neighboring states, and the national level particularly in emergencies when Government agencies must work together.
 - Collect public safety incidents where GIS staff collaborated with different levels of government with GIS data from AZGEO that improved interagency coordination efforts. AZDEMA could be a source for awareness of public safety incidents. Follow up to local agencies can be done by Public Safety Committee co-chairs if needed.

- Provide engagement to sharing Regional agencies to ensure these users are aware of the resources on AZGEO using someone that is already a GIS Specialist (GISS) in the Incident Command Structure (ICS).
2. Facilitates GIS and non-GIS users to communicate related to Public Safety and promotes all forms of professional development.
 - Number of GIS users who participated in professional development opportunities. Examples of opportunities include presenting at annual conferences with national organizations such as NENA, NAPSG, URISA, & NSGIC about the value of public safety gis and how stakeholders are implementing solutions and workflows in the State of Arizona.
 - Number of adhoc workshops & brown bag sessions to GIS & non-gis stakeholders about what public safety gis is and examples of solutions.
 - Attempt to bring GIS into the Legal courts. Examples using Lidar Scanners in Criminal Justice.
 3. Transition all Arizona Public Safety Answering Points (“PSAPs”) with the ability to geospatially route calls.
